FROM THE PASTOR

...for thou art with me... (Psalm 23:4 [KJV]).

More than one month into the season of Spring, people here in the southern tier of Western New York are actively wondering when winter will end? When will we be able to turn off the furnace, to put away the snow shovels and car brushes, to open up the windows and air out our homes? Even though we see tiny sparks of new life: bulbs beginning to emerge in the garden, squirrels and chipmunks chattering, and the addition of bird songs each morning, the cold temperatures and dreary skies attempt to steal the joy of Spring.

In a text message exchange with my husband recently, he shared that he had gained a new insight into what I consider to be a classic text: Psalm 23. Although Biblical scholarship has improved the way Scripture is now presented, with more thoughtful and relevant language usage, there are some texts that do not lend themselves to more contemporary language usage. Psalm 23 is such a text. For me there is such richness in the phrases of Psalm 23: "Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me" (v. 4). The use of "thou," "thy," and a "-th" at the end of words makes this text richer and more robust for me. The insight that my husband shared was that Pope Benedict, in a book of prayers, points out that the LORD never speaks in Psalm 23.

The psalmist is convinced of God's presence with him or her. In fact the psalmist is so convinced that the phrase "for thou art with me" has an equal number of words in Hebrew before and after it. In other words, "for thou art with me" is the center of this Psalm. If the LORD does not speak, then how does the psalmist recognize the presence of the LORD. Pope Benedict suggested that perhaps it was in the rhythmic beating of the staff on the ground.

Perhaps, as you are reading this, you are wishing for the signs of Spring to more accurately reflect the day and month on your calendar. Perhaps, as you are reading this, someone you love or you has experienced a time of hardship, loss or trial. Perhaps, as you are reading this, someone you love or you is experiencing a time of transition. Whatever this season holds for your life and for you, my prayer is that you will hold on to the promise of the LORD's presence with us, and that in times of quietness, you too, may experience the rhythmic sound of the staff reminding you of God's abiding presence.

Stewardship Moment

Based on the book, "The 33 Laws of Stewardship," by Dave Sutherland and Kirk Nowery, Spire Recourses Inc, 2003.

The scene was really nothing to laugh about, but it unleashed howls of delight, caused several fender-benders and brought traffic to a screeching halt on a busy freeway. People were literally jumping form their cars and rushing to grab the loot several hundred thousand dollars worth that was flying out the back door of an armored truck. The driver had failed to lock the door and the money was sucked out as if being removed by a giant vacuum. Even after the police arrived it took quite a while for order to be restored, and much of the money was never recovered.

The security guard failed to be diligent, and it cost him his job. Chances are he never imagined so many strangers would take advantage of his foolish misfortune. His experience reminds us that there are several forms of generosity. In the case of the flying funds, the generosity was completely unintentional. Sometimes, generosity is reluctant, particularly when one feels pressured to give. Generosity can also be manipulative, especially in situations where a gift is given for some ulterior motive. And it's not uncommon for generosity to be self-serving when one gives to gain some attention or advantage. In stark contrast, biblical generosity is like none of these. It is intentional, not the least bit reluctant, not manipulative and definitely not self-serving. Above all, it is full of joy. As the Apostle Paul explained, it is prompted by what one has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver.

When one gives with generosity, there is a conscious recognition of being a channel of blessings. We are passing on what He has passed to us.

God does not promise to solve all our problems, but He does promise to supply all our needs. With our needs met, what more can we ask, and what more can we do than to give in return. His purpose is that we serve Him fully and that we give in the process.

Keep in mind these practical perspectives for givers: Don't talk yourself out of giving. Take money seriously, but not too seriously. Give with a smile, not a cringe.

<u>Chacocente News:</u> Four delegations travelled from California, Ohio, Texas, and New York to the Project in the first quarter of 2018. Working alongside the staff and family members, they worked on the school chapel, a dining area for the secondary school, and a teacher's home in the neighborhood. They also painted the playground, multi purpose court and the upper room of the Big House and dug a holding tank for the pigpen. We are grateful for these delegations and look forward to those yet to come this year.

Because Project Chacocente is in a remote area, our staff is continually challenged to find cost efficient ways to transport the many supplies needed for the school and daily operation of the Project. Food for school lunches, construction materials for delegations, students to and from academic and athletic competitions and on occasion someone needing emergency medical care are just some examples. The time to purchase a vehicle for the Project is now! The leadership team are looking for a high quality, used 4-wheel drive truck and we anticipate that it will cost about \$20,000. Three of our generous supporters have already offered a total of \$7,000 in matching funds, and we hope to meet that challenge and raise the additional \$6,000 needed beyond the match to avoid having to finance any portion of the purchase. Why do we have different colors in the Hurlbut sanctuary through out the year? Using different colors is based on a broad ecumenical tradition and is part of the liturgical calendar during which we recall and remember or celebrate events in the life of Jesus Christ.

Advent: This season proclaims the hope for the coming of Christ. During this season the use of blue is seen throughout the sanctuary. At Hurlbut we prepare the sanctuary for this season during the Hanging of the Greens everyone helps to put up the banners, trees, candles, and other things that celebrate this liturgical season.

Christmas: The color is white to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ.

Epiphany of the Lord: This season is to commemorate the coming of the Magi to the holy family. The color used at this time is green everyone again helps to prepare the sanctuary when the de-hanging of the greens happens. The season after the Epiphany is called ordinary time which goes until Lent. The green color continues, the gospel readings in the lectionary center on stories from the early ministry of Christ.

Lent: The season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and is 40 days not counting Sundays it ends on Holy Saturday. This is a time of fasting and penance by all Christians. This year Wendy Limberg prepared the sanctuary using the color purple.

Easter: This is the season to celebrate Christ's resurrection and rebirth. The color of the Easter season is white and gold. Barbara and Carl Moore prepare the Hurlbut sanctuary every year for this liturgical season. During the season of Easter baptisms, confirmations, and congregational reaffirmation happen throughout this period of time.

Pentecost: This is a season to celebrate the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost and the gift of the Christian unity. The color that Wendy Limberg and Mark Sleggs uses to prepare the Hurlbut sanctuary is red.

Kingdomtide (or Ordinary Time): This season is a time to grow into the understanding of the other events during the year. The color we use is green Marcie Larson prepares the sanctuary during this season. Acts of worship are chosen more because they relate to the scripture readings or theme of the particular day than because they fit the season as a whole.

Hurlbut Committees

Below you will find the names and a brief description of each of our current committees. I have also listed the name of the chairperson of each committee. As you pray about where God is calling you to serve, if one of these committees speaks to you, I invite you to contact the chairperson or to contact me, so that we can talk more about what people on those committees do and if that is a good fit for you. If none of these committees are calling you, but you think that God is calling you, and calling the church to do something new, different, or to revive an old tradition, then contact me so that we may pray together:

Staff/Pastor Parish Relations Committee (Chairperson: Tom Schmidt): this committee reflects biblically and theologically on the role and work of the pastor and staff as they carry out their leadership responsibilities. This committee holds the pastor and staff accountable and also helps the pastor to adjust her leadership based on the needs of the congregation. Members of this committee are required to be members of the church.

Committee on Finance (Chairperson: Dave Foster): this committee gives stewardship of financial resources its priority all year long. This committee works with the Ministry Team to help educate the congregation on Stewardship, completes the annual budget, and is responsible for the generating of revenues to meet the annual expense of the congregation. Members of this committee may or may not be members of the church, and each member is subject to a background check.

Board of Trustees (Chairperson: David Brown): this body is vested with authority and power in matters relating to the real and personal property of the local church. The committee manages all property belonging to the church including parsonages (manses). It receives and administers funds for the local church in conformity with the law. Up to one-third of this committee (3 people) may be non-church members.

Worship Committee: (Chairperson: Marcie Larson): Works with the pastor(s) to ensure that worship events flow smoothly by working to set up the church for various seasons of the church and by ensuring worship supplies are available. Members of the committee are not required to be members of the church.

Communications Committee: (Chairperson: Beverly Hazen): This committee is responsible for all written communication throughout and about the church, including: church bulletin boards, church newsletters, church website, church social media, and articles submitted to local newspapers. Members of this committee are not required to be member of the church.

Nurture Committee: (Chairperson: Amy Stephenson): this committee is responsible for the nurturing of our community's Spirit through fellowship opportunities, Christian Education and Bible Studies, and spiritual retreat events. Members of this committee are not required to be members of the church.

Missions & Outreach: (Chairperson: Sandy Brown): this committee discerns which missions our church will support with its annual budget, plans short-term mission trips, and responds to missional needs as they arise.

Church Historian: Maintains the records and history of Hurlbut Memorial Community United Methodist Church.

Meal Ministry Team: (Chairperson, Sandy Brown): this committee is comprised of the team captains for each of the meals served throughout the summer season. This committee works together to discern how best to carry out this annual summer ministry. Volunteers are always welcome to help with our meal ministry during summer and do not need to be members of our church.

Committee on Native American Ministries Liaison: this person interfaces with our district and conference committees on Native American Ministries and communicates information to and from the local church about Native American Ministries.

Safe Sanctuaries Representative: this person is responsible for ensuring that all persons working with children and vulnerable adults and/or money have a background check and that Safe Sanctuary rules are being followed at all time

Carroll Historical Society By Beverly A. Hazen

It may be surprising to hear that the relatively unfamiliar Carroll Historical Society (CHS) in Frewsburg, NY, has a strong connection to the familiar names of Supreme Court Justice Robert H. Jackson and New York Governor Reuben E. Fenton. Visiting the CHS reveals the fact that both these men of distinction were raised in Frewsburg. The museum features permanent displays of Jackson and Fenton, as well as the original settlers of Frewsburg, the Frew family. John and James, the men for whom Frewsburg was named, arrived in 1809, and their parents, Hugh and Mary, came a few years later.

Robert Jackson (1892 – 1954) came to Frewsburg as a child and graduated from the local high school. "He was a country boy and remembered his town," Carolyn Moynihan, vice-president of CHS said. "He always came home." It seems fitting that he, and some family members, are buried in nearby Maple Grove Cemetery on Frew Run Rd., a short distance from the CHS. This is the final resting place for the Frew family as well. Roadside historical markers pinpoint the Jackson and Fenton childhood homes and the Frew home as well.

The Carroll Historical Society was founded in 1999 and moved their collection in 2003 to the old town highway building located behind the Town Hall. Displays feature early farming practices, the lumbering industry and "Century Farms," the description of the handful of farms that have been in the same family for 100 years. The Fenton Home is one of these.

Moynihan said that the Frewsburg 4th graders and senior government class come every year to visit the museum. They learn about Jackson and Fenton and see the tools used during the once productive forest lumbering industry. Trees were cut and loaded on rafts on the Conewango River. The water carried the rafts to the Allegheny in Warren and on to Cincinnati, Ohio. The rafts were not small: 16' x 16' made a tier; 12 to 26 tiers made a platform; 5 platforms made a Conewango raft. Moynihan said this work was done only in the spring, when the creek was high.

Photographs are throughout the museum and old school books and history books of the county are part of their collection. A butter factory, milk plant and canning factory offered jobs to residents. Iron tools of the farming industry, including a sod cutter and the tool used to remove horns from cattle, are displayed on shelves. The Dunkirk, Warren and Pittsburgh Railway Co, later part of the New York Central and Hudson River RR, transported goods and provided a needed line to the oil fields in Titusville, Pa. On a wall is a large 1854 map of the county that had been in the Fentonville School.

A Military Display is kept current and features local service heroes. "Every year we honor one of the high school classes and those who have entered the service," Moynihan said. Currently, Phillip Kidd, who died in Vietnam in 1968, is being honored. His Purple Heart and three other medals are on display.

Musicians may enjoy seeing a dulcimer owned by Jesse R. Martin, the grandfather of Sterle Vanarsdale in a display case. There's also a tribute to the town's local football star, Shane Conlan, a 1982 graduate of Frewsburg Central School. He was an All American at Penn State, and then an All Pro who played on the Buffalo Bills' Super Bowl teams.






Communication New Web Site


